Dear Friends:

Special Olympics Arizona is a resilient organization that has risen to the challenge the last two years to continue to serve individuals with intellectual disabilities in Arizona. Our return to sports after the pandemic was met with uncertainty and challenges. Navigating constantly changing mitigation measures and mandates. However, we came back strong with only an average 35% reduction in participation return rates and we are proud to have served over 12,000 athletes and partners in 14 different sports. Many things have changed to get us to this point and will continue to change but one aspect that won't change is what drives us to continue to build this community up to ensure inclusion for all.

In 2007 I was first given the opportunity to work with an off-season bowling league for individuals with intellectual disabilities. Feeling nervous would have been an understatement. Yet, as I sat down to collect money and provide lane assignments, I felt like I was home. For the first time I found a group of people with so much skill, joy, and love that I instantly felt a part of their community. I wasn't judged on first impression because of my disability but on the friendship I was willing to offer. From that day forward I have had a love for the mission and a drive to see the organization become bigger and better so all individuals across Arizona with an intellectual disability have a place to feel at home too. I attribute my unwavering support to my reason for being a part of this truly amazing movement. What is yours?

I hope you take this opportunity today to share your why to spread the inclusive movement and if you haven't found your why yet that you might be able to find a little piece of that here.

For too long individuals with intellectual disabilities have been hidden away in the corners of society with little connection to the outside world. Until that changes in every classroom and community across Arizona our mission is not done.

Kara M. Riley has been a police officer since February 1992. Prior to being a police officer, she worked in the corrections field for five years, both at adult and juvenile jails. From 1993 to 2004, she was a police officer and sergeant with the Tucson Airport Authority. In 2004, she started her career with the Oro Valley Police Dept. She held responsibilities in all aspects of the department before being appointed Chief of Police in February 2020. Kara holds a bachelor's degree from the University of Arizona in Sociology and a master's degree in Education. In 2012, she graduated from Northwestern University Police Staff and Command School. In September 2015, she graduated from class 261 at the FBI National Academy.

Kara had the fortunate opportunity to grow up overseas in Taiwan, Abu Dhabi and Sudan, Africa. Her father is a retired professor from the University of Arizona in the field of environmental studies. She is a mother to a University of Arizona student and aunt to six nieces and nephews. She enjoys fishing, watching any sport the University of Arizona is playing, CrossFit and spending time with her husband, Joseph Shelley.

Lynda Weigel Firor Special Olympics Arizona Parent Advocate

Lynda Weigel-Firor has been an independent consultant and grant writer in Tucson for over 20 years. Lynda has helped non-profit organizations raise millions of dollars through grant funding, special events, sponsorships, and major gift acquisitions to help them advance their missions and realize their philanthropic goals.

Lynda is very active in the autism community. She is an Honorary Board Member of the Autism Society of Southern Arizona after having served six years.During her time, Lynda served as Chair of the Parent Peer Support Group. She recently finished a \$1.2M campaign with Intermountain Centers to build the first Sensory Friendly Park for children with Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) in Arizona. She established and co-led for 10 years the first fully inclusive Girl Scout Troop for girls with disabilities in Southern Arizona. Lynda is currently working with a coalition of volunteers and professionals to address affordable housing solutions for autistic adults. Lynda earned a bachelor's degree in Personnel Management from the University of Arizona and is a graduate of the Greater Tucson Leadership class of 2022 and currently serves on the GTL Board of Directors

Lynda is mother to Amber, a Special Olympics Athlete, and Nathan who is an engineer at Raytheon. Lynda just celebrated her 28th anniversary with her husband Randy.


